## **III - ASSESSMENT**

As for the first assessment season (*época normal*) there will be continuous assessment. Continuous assessment is based on three different elements: class participation (20%); semester paper (40%); final test, to be done in class (40%):

- . Class attendance is compulsory for the first assessment season. Those who will miss more than **7 lectures by any reason** cannot be considered for continuous assessment
- . The title and abstract of the semester paper must be hand on 19<sup>th</sup> March.
- . The semester paper is due on 14<sup>th</sup> May.
- . The final test will take place on 21<sup>st</sup> May.
