III - ASSESSMENT

As for the first assessment season (*época normal*) there will be continuous assessment. Continuous assessment is based on three different elements: class participation (20%); semester paper (40%); final test, to be done in class (40%):

- . Class attendance is compulsory for the first assessment season. Those who will miss more than **7 lectures – by any reason** – cannot be considered for continuous assessment.
- . The title and abstract of the semester paper must be hand on 13 March 13.
- . The semester paper is due on May 15.
- . The final test will take place on May 20.
